

The following prints and images were the Highly Commended and Commended for the evaluation of nine prints and thirty-three EDPIs awarded by Graham.. Congratulations everyone.



- **1.** <u>**Title**</u> first (so entries sort by alphabet)
- 2. Your A.S.P.I. Number, Topic/Month, & Year This also helps Print Steward to read your sticks
- 3. Use an <u>underscore</u> between each of these sections (e.g. Title_216_Seasons_Aug16).

- **4. 1920 x 1200** pixels (width x height)
- **5.** Max data **2 MB** (megabyte) (In accordance with VAPS stipulations)
- **6.** Please use your **ASPI Number** on all of your entries both EDPI & Prints!

PRINTS:

The mount size for PRINT entries is 20° x 16° or 50.8×40.6 cms. For use in newsletters and other purposes it would be appreciated if an EDPI of your print could be sent in also, but please label it as follows for Mark's ease of sorting:-

Sequence by Title	Member No	Title	Judge Rating	Prints
1	361	Early Light		Good general early lit image, however, what is your focal point? I many trees competing for my attention.
2	431	Boab By Moonlight	НС	Simple silhouette with a clear focal point. Well seen and processed.
3	601	Magestic Palm		What is your focal point? I suggest that the people, though well composed in this image, compete for interest against the palm trees.
4	361	Together 50 Years	С	The lower portions of the trunks dominate the image and are a clear focal point. Leaves at top left are a little too bright and try to take away some attention.
5	399	Ancient Trunk	НС	Pleasant lighting on this tree trunk give the image some strength
6	431	Lara Wetlands	С	Pleasant sunset image, however, what is your focal point? Where do you want me to look. Might well print well large for a wall hanging.
7	601	Avenue of Trees		This monochrome needs some added contrast to add some strength to this image. What is your focal point? The pathway makes a leading line, but to what?
8	361	Sunrise on the Murray		Attractive river scene, however we have no clear focal point for this image Could look better printed on a metallic paper.
9	399	Sunset Skeleton		Pleasant sunset shot, however what should have been your focal point here, the tree, lacks any real lighting to bring the image to life.

1	326	A Stand of Boabs		Taken at wrong time of day, leads to deep shadows and loss of detail. Investigate Monochrome. Horizon gives appearance of angle. Power lines!!
2	314	Aftermarth of a Torando		Infrared?? No real focal point. Where do I look?
3	326	Boab Tree		What is your real focal point? – the tree, the people, or the sunset? Remove the people.
4	314	By the Riverside		Time of day! What was your intent and focal point? Maybe vertical and zoom closer.
5	331	Crowning Glory	С	Has promise to be a good image with some different processing. What here is your focal point, the trees, or the hill?
6	326	Derby Prisoner Tree		HDR style processing doesn't really suit this long time iconic image. Also appears to slope to the left.
7	601	Eucalyptus Victrix		.Needs some processing vibrance to add some life into the image.
8	447	European Beech		Please never put a title onto a competition image, It is very distracting. Needs some different lighting to add some interest into this image.
9	399	Giant Karri		Exif data suggest this was taken in 2006, why use now? Hard lighting has affected the detail available on the tree trunk.
10	331	Glorious Frame	С	Main tree, what is probably your attempt at a focal point, does get lost into the

				background due to the similar tones. Suggest trying this as a higher contrast monochrome.
11	487	Glowing	HC	Taken in 2006. Why use now? This is a strongly back lit image causing the tree to silhouette. Wish it was a larger sixe to see better.
12	487	Golden Landscape		Very flat lighting leads to an image with little life. The sky here drags down the image. Would re process.
13	399	Historic Boab		White balance of this image needs to warmed up a small amount. We need to add a bit of warmth and vibrance to give the image some life.
14	447	Japanese Black Pine		Again, remove the title for competition images. Lighting needs to varied to add some life and contrast, to give better definition to the image.
15	601	Magical Fairy Tree		Pixel peeping shows green and purple artifacts in the image. This is not uncommon with many Canon cameras. Whilst we a light rainbow, the overall lighting available does nothing to aid your image.
16	431	Mighty River Redgum		Lovely moody image dominated by a well lit river red gum. Foggy mist in background of image aids.
17	431	Nature's Garden		Some lovely warm light assists this image with the good use of a vignette. Just a pity about the small branch art the front of the tree trunk.

21	315	River Bank		There are competing focal points with the warm sections of the image on the LHS takes attention away from the main tree trunk, which is also has messy surrounds.
23	487	Sentinels	НС	Clear focal point makes this an excellent image. Also investigate using a monochrome.
24	315	Standing Alone		The warm tones of the background has become the main focal point taking your attention away from the main tree.
25	331	Stormy Silhouette	С	Use of monochrome and a silhouette works well with this image, however the sky is probably too dark around the top of the tree.
26	326	The Ada Tree		The tree trunks works as a leading line, but to what? Difficult lighting at 11AM.
27	315	The Bare Roots	С	Taken in 2005, why use now? Foreground makes good focal point. Jusu watch your DoF to soften the background.
28	325	Tree S	С	Flat lighting. I'll give a credit because I like the overall image, even though we have no single focal point – there are many and I don't know where you want me to look.
29	325	Tree S2		What is your focal point? Where should I look. Messy foreground, especially of LHS.

30	325	Tree S3		Flat lighting – no life in the image. Needs alternate processing to bring the image to life.
31	325	Tree S4		Lighting?? What is your focal point? Where do you want me to look?
32	314	Waterlogged		Where do want me to look, as there is trees competing to be the main focal point. Lighting is OK, together with the reflections. Zoom closer and isolate better a main focal point.
33	331	Weight of Time	С	Pleasant image however the foliage with lighting competed for interest against the tree on LHS.
