# VAPS TRARALGON 2019 (Rhonda Buitenhuis)

This year the annual VAPS Conference & Exhibition was held at the Federation Uni in Churchill, and hosted by Traralgon Camera Club.

In the exhibition our club result is that we came 41 out of 49 clubs for EDPI and 38th in the prints. The exhibition of images was interesting to view, it seemed that low key portraits were in favour this year, and bird images did well as they always seem to.

The speakers were varied and interesting. Adam Williams' presentation on the formula of interesting photography was something he came up with after analysing winning images across lots of photo competitions. Basically his formula is:

- 90% of winning images are Simplistic, i.e. less is more
- 80% have an immediately recognisable story/subject
- 70% have great light
- The other winning feature is that they connect with the viewer in some way

Ewen Bell was the next speaker and he covered a couple of different topics. His main advice was:

- First of all, look for great light. Photography is all about the light. Find a place with good light, & wait...
- Go slowly
- Get in closer, take a tight shot, then step back, and back again to widen the view.
- Think about what you want to say with your photography.
- Try using a reduced colour palette, for example red & yellow. It creates a more cohesive image.

Ewen also talked about bird photography, using the Olympus mirrorless camera. He made the interesting observation that carparks are a great place to take bird photos, because carparks often abut bushland and the birds that choose to be in or around carparks are used to people moving around and are more likely not to fly off as soon as you get your camera out. Using a shallow depth of field for a blurred background, he showed many examples of unusual birds photographed in carparks both here and overseas.

Keren Dobia's talk on her creative portraits was so interesting. She oozes enthusiasm and artistry, and the difference with Keren's portraits is that she designs and makes the total set, before taking the photos. She uses very little photoshop, choosing to get her imagined scene directly in camera. As an artist, she knows exactly how she wants the finished image to look before she even gets out the camera. Karl Ludic did a presentation on macro photography, again using the We had fun photographing the tiny

Olympus mirrorless camera with 100mm macro lens. We had fun photographing the tiny displays he had set up, using our own cameras.

In all, it was a great weekend, and I would encourage people to think about going along to next year's VAPS conference in Wangaratta. It's a great opportunity to see what others are doing, and to get together with like minded people.

**Before** being the image that you entered for evaluation with the **After** being the image when you have taken on board the Judge's suggestions and made the improvements to the image that the Judge suggested.


## **ANOTHER CHALLENGE**

# **TOPICS, DEFINITIONS and REFERENCE MATERIAL 2019**

### OPEN (To be submitted in January, March, May, September)

This familiar topic allows members to continue developing their skills and extending the range of photographic styles that they attempt. Members may consider revisiting previous topics; re-working an earlier image, implementing acquired knowledge; trying new photographic genres; using topics of their choice; or experimenting with aspect ratios, colour or monochrome or HDR treatments. The variety produced under this topic will assist with the choice of images for VAPS.

# OPEN - LONG EXPOSURE (To be submitted in July) □ DARKNESS - Highlighting darkness (To be submitted in August)


Low-key photography is a style where the main elements are darkness and negative space. It's an excellent way to create a certain mood. These dark images might—suggest a dark mood—loneliness or danger—but they don't have to! Darkness can—also be used to create a sense of safety or adventure, for instance.

You can create a low-key photograph in a variety of ways. It can be an underexposed photo; it can be made in the studio, at home, or outdoors; the subject matter can be anything from a landscape to a tiny detail. The main thing is to create something overwhelmingly dark.

It is worth viewing the winner and some finalists of the 2019 Bowness Photography Prize at the Monash Gallery of Art (corner Jells Rd and Ferntree Gully Road, Wheelers Hill).

### **DIGITAL IMAGES (EDPI):**

- Images may either be created with a digital camera or created with a conventional camera and scanned into electronic format.
- Images may be enhanced or manipulated using image editing software, but the original image must have been made by the entrant.
- As per VAPS specifications (www.vaps.org.au), maximum horizontal dimension is 1920 pixels and the maximum vertical dimension is 1080 pixels.
- Each image file must be in sRGB JPEG format and a maximum of up to 5 Mb in size (5000kb).

Name your data image with Title of photo and your Club member number, separated by an underscore, followed by the topic & date eg: **Sunset on Woolamai Beach\_126\_Open\_July2018**. Bring these specially named images on a memory stick to the meeting for transfer to a Club CD to be given to the judge.

### **PRINTS:**

- Prints may be ANY size, up to a maximum of 40cm x 50cm (16in x 20in) when mounted.
- ALL prints MUST be mounted.

- Panoramic print formats are acceptable, but must fit on a 40cm x 50cm (16in x 20in) board.
- Prints mounted to a total thickness greater than 5mm will not be accepted.
- Please also include a digital image of the photo on the memory stick you bring to the meeting labelled as for the EDPI, but starting with PRINT: e.g. PRINT\_Sunset on Woolamai Beach\_126\_Open\_July2018
