EXHIBITIONS AND COMPETITIONS

Gippsland Interclub Photographic Exhibition

East Gippsland Photographic Society is hosting the 2023 Gippsland Interclub Exhibition. The exhibition will be held at the East Gippsland Art Gallery, 2 Nicholson Street, Bairnsdale and will be open from Friday 4th August until Saturday 2nd September. The official opening will be from 5:30 – 7:30pm on Friday 4th August. There will be a social weekend following the opening. Clubs will need to organise their own accommodation.

All images in the exhibition must have been taken in Gippsland by a photographer who is a member of one of the participating clubs: Latrobe Valley Camera Club, Warragul Camera Club, South Gippsland Photography Club, East Gippsland Photographic Society, Sale Camera Club and Phillip Island Camera Club. Each of these clubs will submit 10 framed images, making up an exhibition of 60 images framed in black mounts and in the exhibition frames. The mounted image must measure 406 x 508 (16" x 20").

There will be a judging panel of three independent and diversly qualified judges set up by the hosting club. The Roy Berryman Certificate is awarded to the maker of the winning image. Also awarded is the Winning Club Perpetual Banner. The winning club is determined by totalling the points awarded to the ten entries for each club. Additional points are allocated accordingly -1st place x 5 points, 2nd place x 4 points, 3rd place x 3 points, merit x 2 points.

The maximum number of entries per person is two. Participants can select any topic (i.e. Open) and there are no restrictions on the type of photographic representation or print types including colour, black and white, toned, hand coloured and or digitally manipulated creative images.

The back of the entry will need to include a title, the makers name and the club name. For the club entry form, the following will need to be included (for each image): title of image, your name, picture location, type of camera, focal length, ISO, aperture and speed.

There are other rules and conditions of entry, and it's best if intending exhibitors make themselves familiar with these. If you wish to participate in this exhibition/competition, please send a maximum of two entries per person EDI with metadata to Rob McKay <u>roblinmc@gmail.com</u> or (20 x16) prints by 10th June. If you wish to be sent further details, please contact Lorraine on transorraine@gmail.com

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT SUBMITTING IMAGES FOR EVALUATION DIGITAL IMAGES (EDI):

- Images may either be created with a digital camera (including a mobile phone camera) or created with a conventional camera and scanned into electronic format.
- Images may be enhanced or manipulated using image editing software, but the original image must have been made by the entrant.
- As per VAPS specifications (www.vaps.org.au), maximum horizontal dimension is 1920 pixels and the maximum vertical dimension is 1080 pixels.
- Each image file must be in sRGB JPEG format and a maximum of up to 5 Mb in size (5000kb).

Name your data image with Title of photo and your Club member number, separated by an underscore, followed by the topic and month when the judge will present the images to the members at the monthly meeting eg: **Sunset on Woolamai Beach** 126 Open Feb2022.

Maximum of three entries in total either in PRINTS, EDPI or a combination of the two.

NOVICE CATEGORY REINSTATED:

To encourage new members to participate in the monthly evaluation, it has been decided to re-instate a NOVICE section. This will be in the EDPI (Electronic Digital Projected Image format. We would like to emphasise that this is not a competition but a learning opportunity. If you need assistance to get started please speak to one of the Committee Members, who are only too happy to help. Maximum of three entries.

ARE WE HAVING PRINTS?

We have introduced prints again for the evaluation topics in 2022. A total of **three** images only can be entered into the evaluation. **Three** prints or **three** EDPIs or a combination prints/EDPIs totalling **three** can be submitted. The exception to this is the Folio topic, where a combination of four prints or four EDPIs or a combination of prints/EDPIs can be submitted.

When entering prints, we ask that an EDPI of the print be entered also as our plan is to have the prints displayed but to show them in the slide-show so that everyone can see the detail on screen. It is important that print EDPIs be labelled with PRINT e.g. PRINT_Title of image Membership No_Open 202_Feb2022

Please bring the actual print of the image along to the Newhaven Yacht Club Clubroom on the day of the meeting for it to be displayed for the judge's final perusal and for members to view.

PRINTS

- Prints may be ANY size, up to a maximum of 40cm x 50cm (16in x 20in) when mounted.
- ALL prints MUST be mounted.
- Panoramic print formats are acceptable, but must fit on a 40cm x 50cm (16in x 20in) board.
- Prints mounted to a total thickness greater than 5mm will not be accepted.
- Please also include a digital image of the photo you send in labelled as for the EDPI, but starting with
 PRINT: e.g. PRINT_Sunset on Woolamai Beach_126_Open_July2018

FOLLOW UP ON AI AND PHOTOGRAPHY

Thanks to Rob McKay for requesting information from photographic organisations regarding AI and photography rules and regulations following the discussion at our May meeting. Rob received the following responses.

The following information was received on 1st June, 2023 from the Bronwyn Casey, Federation Internationale de l'Art Photographique (FIAP) Liaison Officer, Australia.

Hi Rob,

To a large degree the concerns with AI are already covered by wording in the existing FIAP Patronage rules. This excerpt is part of the clauses in II.2 of the Patronage rules document:

"IMPORTANT: Concerning digital entries, authors must preserve intact with no alteration, the original metadata of images. In case of dispute relating to compliance with FIAP regulations, the fact of FIAP not being able to access this important data could result in the author being sanctioned.

Any person who is found guilty of using photographic material that was not captured in camera by that person will be excluded for life from FIAP activities."

AND in II.8 E

"E) The mention that all parts of the image have to be photographed by the author who is holding the copyright of all works submitted."

AND in II.8F

"that any refusal to cooperate with FIAP or any refusal to submit the original files as captured by the camera, or failure to provide sufficient evidence, will be sanctioned by FIAP.

So in other words, all parts of the image must have been captured but the person using a camera. As to then modifying these components and having composite photos, that has always been possible and is permitted in salons with the exception of sections that specifically ban modification of the photo, e.g. nature.

Having said the above, I am aware that FIAP will soon be making this even clearer BUT the above does already cover this.

The following information was received from the Australian Photographic Society President, Greg McMillan on 4th June, 2023

Hi Robert

Certainly an interesting and current topic indeed.

I am aware you are not a member of APS so understanding the context of your question would be useful. Are you asking simply from a personal perspective, interested on the potential impact on a club competition or interested in joining the APS and seeking your honours and you want to know whether AI may have an impact on your images being judged?

Nothwithstanding, APS is keeping a watch over the ongoing impact of AI and we are very aware of some of the highlighted examples of 'AI' images impacting on some types of competitions.

At this stage, as you probably know, competition sections such as nature/wildlife, streets, photojournalism and travel have quite prescriptive definitions and post-production limits on what a photographer can do already.

In Open (or similar) sections, the current rules do require the image and all elements (if say a composite) to be taken by the photographer. This is more detailed in competition rules. Of course there are many elements of AI currently used in post-production that fit within current rules, not just for APS but FIAP and PSA.

However, while not explicitly stated, the current rules prevent, for example, digitally created AI images from text being submitted. Ongoing, we will certainly adjust rules/conditions/definitions as needed or if they need to be clearer. Nature/Wildlife definitions are good examples of where there is regular review and amendments to rules made to ensure the integrity of what is nature versus wildlife.

One of the challenges I see (and this is just my view) is that AI is a broad and multi-used term. If a competition, for example, is seeking to 'exclude' AI images then defining that is not necessarily easy but there is no doubt that AI is rapidly impacting many parts of our lives and we may well see new competitions/sections emerge for those who seek to use AI in a creative way beyond what is currently allowed in the current rules and conditions.

I hope that was of some benefit.
