



WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT SUBMITTING IMAGES FOR EVALUATION DIGITAL IMAGES (EDI):

- Images may either be created with a digital camera (including a mobile phone camera) or created with a conventional camera and scanned into electronic format.
- Images may be enhanced or manipulated using image editing software, but the original image must have been made by the entrant.
- As per VAPS specifications (www.vaps.org.au), maximum horizontal dimension is 1920 pixels and the maximum vertical dimension is 1080 pixels.
- Each image file must be in sRGB JPEG format and a maximum of up to 5 Mb in size (5000kb).

Name your data image with Title of photo and your Club member number, separated by an underscore, followed by the topic and month when the judge will present the images to the members at the monthly meeting eg: **Sunset on Woolamai Beach_126_Open_Feb2022**.

Maximum of three entries in total either in PRINTS, EDPI or a combination of the two.

NOVICE CATEGORY REINSTATED:

To encourage new members to participate in the monthly evaluation, it has been decided to re-instate a NOVICE section. This will be in the EDPI (Electronic Digital Projected Image format. We would like to emphasise that this is not a competition but a learning opportunity. If you need assistance to get started please speak to one of the Committee Members, who are only too happy to help. Maximum of three entries.

ARE WE HAVING PRINTS?

We have introduced prints again for the evaluation topics in 2022. A total of **three** images only can be entered into the evaluation. **Three** prints or **three** EDPIs or a combination prints/EDPIs totalling **three** can be submitted. The exception to this is the Folio topic, where a combination of four prints or four EDPIs or a combination of prints/EDPIs can be submitted.

When entering prints, we ask that an EDPI of the print be entered also as our plan is to have the prints displayed but to show them in the slide-show so that everyone can see the detail on screen. It is important that print EDPIs be labelled with PRINT e.g. PRINT_Title of image Membership No_Open 202_Feb2022

Please bring the actual print of the image along to the Newhaven Yacht Club Clubroom on the day of the meeting for it to be displayed for the judge's final perusal and for members to view.

PRINTS

- Prints may be ANY size, up to a maximum of 40cm x 50cm (16in x 20in) when mounted.
- ALL prints MUST be mounted.
- Panoramic print formats are acceptable, but must fit on a 40cm x 50cm (16in x 20in) board.
- Prints mounted to a total thickness greater than 5mm will not be accepted.
- Please also include a digital image of the photo you send in labelled as for the EDPI, but starting with
 PRINT: e.g. PRINT_Sunset on Woolamai Beach_126_Open_July2018

Please note: If an image does not receive Highly Commended, it can be submitted into only one more club evaluation. This allows the maker to adjust the image following the judge's recommendations. Please see next page for the judge's evaluations.

Sequence by Title	Member No	Title	Judge Rating	EDPI
1	326	A Squadron		Yes, the image is in focus, so a fast shutter speed has played a role. However, as the pelicans are static on the ground, we need to see a point of difference, such as one taking off, some action that has been captured in focus due to a fast shutter speed.
2	866	Beach fun		Here we see kids splashing about in the shallows. The shutter speed has been fast enough to capture the water droplets in focus, arms in focus, therefore an effective use of freezing motion.
3	875	Cape Barren Goose	С	We have a definite action shot where the shutter speed has been fast enough to capture in focus wings with all the detail. Other technical and aesthetics have been done very well.
4	862	Charlette Plains Bore	НС	A great idea to capture the bore water back lit with a fast shutter speed to bring out the detail, freezing the action. A slight criticism would be to increase the exposure or enhance the whites selectively on the darker sections of water. This image meets the brief to a tee.
5	852	Cooling Down	НС	Well framed action shot utilizing the light to show us detail in the wing. Perfectly frozen in a moment of time as the bat flew low in the water, nicely capturing the splash as it only skims the surface.
6	326	Cross Country		We have a fast enough shutter speed to have frozen the wheel motion we can see the spokes. We do have some low-resolution issues that pulls the image down. Nicely framed with room for the rider to move.
7	886	Dancing Duck		An interesting close-up image of the duck that holds our attention. However, the blurred left-hand corner has missed the brief. It can be a good action effect to include blur, but the brief specifically called for fast shutter speed to stop time. A better approach would have been to have gotten lower and include all of the dancing duck caught in an interesting moment in time, all sharp.
8	862	Darling river White Necked Heron		The moment in time with wings in flight has been captured, no doubt. Other factors to be an awardwinning photo is overall sharpness needs to be better, as does detail in the bird itself. Keep at it, as

				birds in flight is not easy to do and practice, experimenting with aperture, ISO and shutter speed will produce more rewarding results. Cropping may be a factor here as to lack of detail. A longer lens will also help.
9	487	Dive Bomber		The cormorant(?) has been placed centrally in the frame and is far away. This works, for the image, with the diver silhouetted against the grey sea. Your eye goes straight to it. To open up the scene has been the best approach. It makes it a simpler image to lessen the distracting effect rippled waves. There has been some sharpening of the bird (halo). Overall the image works when you put it against the definition.
10	852	Dragon fly Dance	НС	The maker has shown great camera skills and use of light to capture this excellent work. Skimming on the water, darting about as they go through their mating ritual. Patience, observation, knowing where the light is, (backlight), what the reflections will do adding to the impact. 1/2000 at 500mm, to get an image like this is a very good result indeed. I suspect there were many more failures than keepers. Well done.
11	866	Spinebill	НС	Shutter speed certainly freezes the action of the bird in flight, hovering like a bee feeding on nectar. The diagonal of the flower, bird and flower, frames the subject against mostly blurred unobtrusive foliage. The back light highlighting detail in the wing is stunning. Some selective processing (maybe not) on the bird to bring out detail has been done extremely well, less is more. Your camera skills, if no selective processing is excellent. The flower part blurred over the upper breast is of no consequence. We see a moment in time, beautifully captured perfectly focused where it needs to be.
12	885	Escape		To have the bat on the top LH thirds intersection, flying away from us, for whatever reasons seems to work. The whole image is out of focus unfortunately. We don't have a sharpness issue, so shutter speed is ok. If we had the subject in focus, we would have had a more impactful image. The moment in time has been realised though.

13	399	Good Surf	С	Harsh light has been well handled. Depth of field well handled. The moment in time has been captured very well. From continuous burst shots (probably), the maker has picked a good one, subject on a diagonal, one arm up, one down. A well-balanced image, but it might be said a slight crop off the RH edge would improve aesthetics of composition.
14	886	incoming		The diagonal leading lines in the timber lead us to the LH half of the frame where the action is. There is a focal length issue where our bees are out of focus. This combined with a faster shutter speed would have produced a very dramatic image. The bee with most interest is the top RH one, hanging in mid-air. We have the moment in time, but how good would it have been in focus and freezing the wings as well?
15	885	Lunch	С	Nice shot a bit of action going on with this gull. He looks like he is running away with his catch. Plenty of detail in the subject, with the splash around the feet caught in the moment. Harsh light dealt with successfully.
16	866	Ocean action		Certainly fast enough on the shutter speed to catch the detail in the crashing waves. If you have a long lens, a much more intimate shot would have provided a stronger impact. We don't need the cliff for dramatic action. Harsh light has been dealt with, maintaining some definition in the waves and swirling water.
17	487	Overflow	С	The concept has definitely been seen by the maker with a shutter speed to freeze the water. Focus has fallen on the sunlit rock between the cascades leaving most of the cascades out of focus a tad. Nicely done to capture the layers of falling water, with the shaded areas still with detail.
18	447	PRINT – Woman's Soccer		Perfect capture of a moment in time with the ball in mid-air. To improve that impact, crop most of the image out. Play with the 3 or 4 players only. Continuous shot would have given more images to choose from. The ball and players are nicely contrasted by the green grass.

19	447	PRINT – Junior Socceroo's	С	This is a tighter scene than the other soccer image with frozen action, therefore more dramatic; girls running, goalie defending and concentrating faces. The players positions lead to the focal point of the ball in mid-air. Nicely done.
20	399	Running in		Nicely done action shot focused well on the girl running in to the sea. A well balance image of the subject clearly showing running action, one foot off the ground, the other nearly.
21	487	Take off		Fast shutter speed of 1/4000 certainly gets the rotor blades static. The helicopter is only just off the ground. Better timing with some distance to the ground would have more impact with static in focus blades that we expect to see some blur in reality.
22	852	Taking a Bath	НС	Lovely capture of the goose, well framed and plenty of detail of focus and sharpness of flapping wings and droplets flying off.
23	326	Up in the Air		A good photo of the plants taken from underneath, however there is little to see that has been captured by utilizing a fast shutter speed. 1/500 has been used, but we have a static plant that could only be moving from wind. This does not really meet the definition. If your club ever has a competition utilizing depth of field in the image, then you will do better.
24	399	Wipeout		Well done on capturing the wipe-out. Detail in the water splash and frozen surfer in difficult lighting conditions sets the scene. A tad soft, unfortunately. The ankle rope forming a semi-circle is a nice touch.
25	889	Butterfly		The butterfly has been captured well with all of the detail. However, as it appears to be resting, perhaps fluttering, the shutter speed has not provided a dramatic image, A wow factor utilizing fast shutter speed would be the butterfly in flight. Nicely framed image with positioning and contrast in colours.
26	889	Brown Cuckoo Dove	С	It appears the bird is coming into land, so we have some nice action in the wings captured relatively sharply due to a fast shutter speed. Well done.
